




Soca, Waaba, Tuka and Maco discuss digital safety skills.

Mobile phones, tablets, and smart watches are all digital devices. Follow the traffic light rule and use these devices more safely.

GREEN means safe and fun things that you are allowed to enjoy alone or with friends!



RED means something that feels scary, strange, or is not allowed. Take a screenshot of it and show it to a safe adult.









YELLOW means something new. Ask an adult before you get a new game, reply to a message, or click a link.







Always talk to an adult if you're not sure what to do online or if something feels odd.

This is my best drawing yet!




Maco shows the drawing to Tuka on his phone. Suddenly, he notices a message he received online. The message says:

You don't know who the message is from. Let's take a screenshot and show it to an adult.








Waaba and Soca are nearby and overhear their friends talking.

KIP CREW'S TIPS FOR ONLINE SAFETY

Soca uses a picture of a flower as his profile picture in an online game. Then others won't know by looking at the picture whether Soca is an adult or a child. This helps Soca stay safe online.

What should the Kip Crew do if they receive a message from someone they don't know? What to do if their real name is asked online? Talk to the Kip Crew about how they can stay safe online.

Remind the Kip Crew that they can always talk to a safe adult if they are not sure what to do.

Cut out the cards and place them face down. Flip two at a time to find matching pictures!














































YOUR HELP IS NEEDED!

This little creature is sad because he saw something upsetting online. None of his trusted friends or adults know about it. The creature doesn't know what to do. Draw or write how you could comfort the little one or how he could get help. You can come up with your own ideas or choose one of the Kip crew's tips.

This workbook is suitable for ages 5–9. It can be read alone or with an adult. The story and tasks give the child the opportunity to reflect on digital safety skills. The adult listens to the child and can help with any questions or concerns related to the topic. It is important for the child to learn in advance how to act in different situations in everyday digital life. It is also important that children know what to do if they encounter difficult situations or unpleasant things online. Every child deserves care and support from safe adults, also in digital environments.
